# **Public Comment Period**

Chair Radcliff asked if any members of the public wished to comment. There were none.

### Approval of Minutes for September 13, 2023

Chair Radcliff requested approval of the September 13, 2023, meeting minutes. A motion was made by Ms. Chenery and seconded by Mr. Hewa, and the minutes were unanimously approved as presented.

#### **Election Update**

Chair Radcliff spoke about the Virginia general election in November, where all 140 General Assembly seats were up for re-election. She said the election resulted in Democrats gaining majorities in both the House and the Senate.

Chair Radcliff noted that 670 years of service was lost with this set of elections and redistricting decisions.

Chair Radcliff introduced Nicole Riley to provide an overview of the election results and changes in leadership for key committees.

Ms. Riley reviewed the following election highlights:

- Democrat control of both Chambers
  - House Chamber: Democrats 51/ Republicans 49
  - Senate Chamber: Democrats 21/Republicans 19
- Turnout was ~41% statewide, which is in line with the last off-year election
- Virginia is in its third year of allowing early voting, with ~32% of citizens casting ballots during early voting this election cycle.

Secretary Merrick noted that Governor Youngkin has hosted General Assembly leadership at the Executive Mansion and is actively building relationships with this group.
